


Certificate of Source

We hereby certify the
Bastogne Walnut tonewood utilized in this instrument
Oregon Wild Wood item # _____, was sourced as follows:

This Bastogne Walnut was purchased by us, dry and in slab form, in 2005. It was said to have been salvaged from a wind fallen tree in SW Oregon in the mid 1990's, though we did not participate in that salvage.

These trees are extremely rare, as they only result about 1% of the time when English Walnut cross pollinates with Claro Walnut. The trees do not produce nuts, thus, they do not self perpetuate as a species. The wood is notably harder than either English or Claro Walnut. The name is taken from the European counterpart to this tree, a cross between English and Turkish Walnut. To the best of our knowledge, the acquisition and harvest of this item was in compliance with all applicable laws.
